Goal of Study	Students will gain a new perspective of the culture of this nation by examining the interconnection of various elements including the history and culture of Tohoku Region, rebuilding effort from the 2011 earthquake and tsunami attack, as well as certain ways Japanese people expressed themselves at different periods in history.									
	*Special Note: Under the current COVID-19 situation, the course for this semester is designed to be attended real-time online only. If international travel restrictions are lifted, the course may eventually be attended in person in the actual classroom on Aobayama Campus. The first time the class meets—Wednesday, April 13—will be an opportunity for both the lecturer and the students to check that the online setup works properly. The necessary information for attending the class online including the type of app to be utilized will be given via Google Classroom site for the course. Please also note that the class schedule may need to be revised as we proceed in the course because of COVID-19 or other circumstances. Fieldwork is what has characterized this course for many years, but because of the pandemic, the class will not be able to conduct any fieldwork activity in a physical sense unless the situation changes dramatically for the better and the university revises its guideline.
