④ 授業題目	The Law of the Sea
④ 授業の目的と概要	This course will provide students with an overview of the law of the sea, which is a field of public international law addressing the uses of the oceans. It will be provided as a lecture describing the current legal regime of the oceans, primarily based on the United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea (UNCLOS). It will examine how the law has been put into practice, and discuss the challenges faced by the current legal regime.
④ 学修の到達目標	The goal of this course is for students to acquire basic knowledge of concepts, rules and precedents in the field of the law of the sea. A further goal is for students to enhance their abilities in applying rules of international law to draw conclusions and to formulate arguments for specific cases.
④ 授業内容・方法と進度予定	This course will be provided as a lecture, covering the law of the sea in 15 weeks. The course will be provided in on-demand video format until the damage to the classroom from the earthquake is repaired. Once the classroom is operational, the course will be conducted in person (with an option of online participation, if there are overseas participants due to COVID-19 restrictions). The course will proceed as follows (subject to minor adjustments as necessary):  <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. The history and structure of the law of the sea</li> <li>2. ④ 方法	Grading will be based on assignments (60%), and a term-end paper (40%). There will be no written examination at the end of the term. Assignments (60%): Each week, students will be required to submit assignments online through Google Classroom. Each assignment will consist of questions relating to basic issues addressed in the lecture. Term-end Paper (40%): At the end of the term, students will be required to submit a paper on a fictional case concerning the law of the sea.
