Class subject	Contemporary Chinese politics and Society I I
Object and summary of class	This course aims to provide students with a basic understanding of contemporary Chinese nationalism. With the birth of the modern nation-state, people increasingly began to see themselves as a member of a larger political entity—one that their ancestors could not have even imagined. China is no exception. This course will focus on China in the 1980s, a period of enormous societal change driven by rapid economic development. During this time, China's past was rewritten to align with visions of a better future, giving rise to a new form of Chinese nationalism. What role has the Chinese state played in this process? What forces have shaped modern Chinese nationalism? And what impact does this new nationalism have on Chinese society and politics? This course will begin with a general overview of the modern nation-state and nationalism, followed by an in-depth examination of Chinese nationalism from the 1980s to the present.
Goal of study	By the end of this class, students will have: (1) gained a basic understanding of the relationship between nationalism and the modern nation-state, (2) acquired specific knowledge about contemporary Chinese nationalism.
Contents and progress schedule of the class	Students will be required to read assigned textbook chapters weekly. Each week, one student will be responsible for summarizing and providing key talking points on the assigned chapter (Generally, we will cover one chapter per week).
Record and evaluation method	Attendance: 10% ; Presentations: 40% ; Contribution to Discussions: 30% ; Term Paper: 20%.
