Class subject	International Conference [Craft of Research]
Object and summary of class	This course is intended to introduce and improve how to conduct effective and meaningful research. Because law departments of Japanese universities traditionally have not required submission of graduation papers, most law students do not know how to conduct research or write academic papers. However, if you are considering attending graduate school, you will need the skill to research and write academic papers. By reading the famous textbooks (see below) and presenting your own research agenda, you will learn the essential skills.
Goal of study	Participants will learn how to conduct effective and meaningful research and how to write academic papers.
Contents and progress schedule of the class	1. Introduction Each participant is required to present her/his own research agenda. The agenda can be tentative/primitive because we will improve it during this course. 2.
