English language lesson for Tohoku students	Sendai Time: Thursday, September 3 at 9:00 am	Tohoku students will participate in an interactive English language lesson with the English Language Institute (ELI), break out groups may be utilized for small group discussion. An asynchronous activity will be assigned in relation to the project work they will do with UM students. This activity can be conducted independently anytime throughout the day.	1.5 hour synchronous; 1.5 hours
Engagement with Japanese language class	Sendai Time: Friday, September 4 at 9:00 am	Dr. Brian Dowdle will invite the Tohoku students to engage with his Japanese Civilizations class. He will provide a two-part lecture and facilitate a discussion on the on the issues of urban-rural migration and revitalization efforts in Japan and Montana. UM and Tohoku students will work together to understand these problems and propose solutions and responses. Students will spend half the class in English, half in Japanese.	2 hours synchronous
Follow-up to class on urban-rural migration	Friday, September 4	Tohoku students will reflect on the class time spent with the UM students: both on the issues of urban-rural migration, but also comparing and contrasting cultural approaches by each student group. Students will individually provide brief response videos to their experience.	1 hour asynchronous
Introduction to an American family: host family connections	Sendai Time: Saturday, September 5 at 9:00 am	Tohoku students will be partnered and assigned with a local Montana family for a discussion of respective cultures, family life, environmental issues, etc. This same family would likely host the students in Fall 2021 for a full weekend.	1 hour synchronous
Introduction to developing a presentation.	September 5-6	Tohoku students will begin to create framework for final presentation. They will be introduced to the concept of the presentation through video lectures provided by Dr. Phear, with suggested research links and presentation development ideas. They are responsible for envisioning their final presentation during this time.	1.5 hrs asynchronous
Introduction to Environmental Issues	Sendai Time: Monday, September 7 at 9:00 am	Dr. Phear will follow-up with any questions the Tohoku students may have based on their presentation framework studies. She and Dr. Dan Spencer will then provide an introduction to global environmental issues in Montana, with a special component on commonalities in challenges faced by both Montana and Japan.	1.5 hours synchronous

Follow-on lessons based on engagement with Japanese language class	Thursday, September 10	Tohoku students will reflect on their engagement with the UM students, drawing on readings and videos provided on U.S. society and culture. They will post videos of themselves responding to specific questions posed by UM faculty.	1.5 hour asynchronous
Continued engagement with Global Leadership Initiative students	Sendai Time: Friday, September 11 at 9:00 am	Part two in facilitated cross-cultural engagement between the Global Leadership Initiative UM students and Tohoku students.	1.5 hours synchronous
Project presentation work	Friday, September 11	Drawing on their engagement with UM students and themes studied over the past week, Tohoku students will enjoy additional readings and assignments to achieve the next step in their presentation development. Materials will be provided on natural resource issues in Montana, featuring videos and readings from the Montana Natural History Center, the National Park System, and the Salish and Kootenai Tribes.	1.5 hours asynchronous
Continued host family connections	Sendai Time: Saturday, September 12 at 9:00 am	Tohoku students will meet again with their American host families to play games and discuss cross-cultural attributes of each society. English language instruction	Sendai Time: Sunday, September 13 at 9:00 am	Tohoku students will participate in an interactive English language lesson with the English Language Institute, focusing on vocabulary required for presentations and public speaking. Break out groups will be utilized for small group discussion. An asynchronous activity will be assigned in relation to support project work presentation work. Students will use this day to finalize their presentations.	1 hour synchronous; 1.5 hours asynchronous

Student Presentations Part Two and Official Program Closing	Sendai Time: Tuesday, September 15 at 9:00 am	The second group of Tohoku students will present on lessons learned during their exchange on issues of culture, society, and the environment. UM officials will provide closing remarks. Certificates and t-shirts will be viewed on line and will be available at Tohoku University upon the students' return to campus.	1.5 hours synchronous
